- Immigrants are expected to account for all net labour force growth by 2011, and for all net population growth by 2031.
- 46% of the Toronto Region's population was born abroad. Skilled immigrants are valuable resources for understanding product and service needs in ethno-specific markets.
- Skilled immigrants provide a global competitive advantage. They can help build international networks and improve relationships with global suppliers.

Over 100,000 new immigrants settle in the Toronto Region each year and they are looking to put their skills to work.
